Proclamation

Public Schools Week - April 22nd through 26th, 1968

Freemasons have supported public education from it's very inception in the American colonies. We recognize that the PUBLIC SCHOOL IS THE CORNERSTONE OF LIBERTY. It is a proper foundation stone upon which today's youth will erect an edifice of good government, human understanding and individual dignity.

The problems of the public schools today are far different from those of 1920 when Grand Master Charles Albert Adams founded Public Schools Week. They cannot be understood or resolved by only one week of study but we can in one week, arrange for an exchange of ideas with some of the dedicated teachers and school officials, for the purpose of sharing those fundamental values of our free enterprise system which made America so strong.

I request every Mason and every Masonic Lodge in California and Hawaii to participate actively in a Public Schools Program during the observance of Public Schools Week, April 22 through 26, 1968, which I hereby proclaim.

I direct that no Lodge meetings or programs be held during this period except for Public Schools Observance with the exception of Stated Meetings.

1. Read at the March and April Stated Meetings.

2. Mailed to every member of the Lodge.

VISIT YOUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Public Schools Week Observance — April 22nd through 26th

Under the direction of the Grand Master, the Masons of California salute their school administrators and teachers in their annual visit during the last full week of April. Masons throughout the state are urged constantly to display their interest in the public schools - not as critics or in controversy - but in intelligent study of the needs of the schools and in promoting constructive support among their friends and neighbors. We want to help create - where necessary and maintain a feeling of pride in what we consider the finest system for puble education today.

However, there are many who would destroy or cripple our schools by their unfair criticism, by voting down necessary school bond issues, and by promoting non-public parochial systems. Our young people should have the best educational system available to meet the problems of a complicated society and the highly competitive business world.

Our public schools recently have become the center of many financial, social, religious and political problems. Local property taxes are increasing rapidly, making it difficult for the schools to keep pace with growth and changing city patterns. Civil rights movements and the de-segregation of schools has upset the traditional ideals of the neighborhood school in many areas. The doctrine of church and state separation has been challenged. Some would wish to introduce limited religious education in the schools while other people are trying to obtain financial support for private religious schools.

In some high schools and in our state colleges and universities, students and teachers are debating the issues of our selective service system and the ethics of war and peace. Many feel that they should not be compelled to obey laws which violate their conscience. In California, as in many parts of the world, our accepted standards are being severely tested by the young people.

The Masons of California have carried on the task of supporting the public schools by an annual observance which was started by Charles Albert Adams, who served as Grand Master in 1920. Your visit to one or more schools at this time will be the least you can do. Masons do believe in education. LET THERE BE LIGHT! Paul C. Shelly,
