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MASTER'S MESSAGE

LAS PALMAS CHAPTER OF DeMOLAY

In Masonic circles it is keenly recognized that the future of the Order depends upon our youth. Grand Lodge, which had previously forbidden Blue Lodges to sponsor DeMolay

Chapters, did an about face and made it legal.

A group of Las Palmians discussing the situation in early 1966 noted that Jobs Daughters and Rainbow Girls cutnumber DeMolays 44,000 to 17,000. They also observed that smaller Bakersfield was maintaining 4 chapters enrolling 500 boys. They decided that Las Palmas Lodge could well sponsor a chapter. Wm. Odell Lingerfelt agreed, appointed Harold Paul chairman, and signed a resolution to the Supreme Council requesting Letters Temporary.

Active recruiting by many members resulted in the signing of the required 25 charter members who were initiated by State Center Chapter in Las Palmas Temple in June 1966. Regular meetings began in September 1966.

The problem of providing paraphernalia proved difficult but was accomplished by means of contributions from Bethels 49, 197 and 243 Jobs Daughters, Sciots Pyramid, Tehran Temple, Las Palmas Dates, Clovis and State Center Chapters DeMolay, La Sierra Chapter O.E.S. and D.

Movers.

The chapter was instituted Feb. 11, 1967 with Marshall Doris, first Master Councilor and a full complement of officers. Degree teams learned the ritual and initiated enough candidates to bring the roll to 45 members. This qualified them for a charter which was presented by Mr. Richardson for the Supreme Council on October 21, 1967.

Entered two teams in the city basketball league and won

runner-up trophy in the Malibu league.

Entered a team in the state baskebtall play-off (DeMolav) in Stockton.

WORDS OF WISDOM

A wise old owl sat in an oak. The more he heard, the less he spoke. The less he spoke, the more he heard. Now wasn't he a wise old bird?

PRONUNCIATION

The average man entering Masonry meets many elements of a vocabulary strange to him. Errors in pronunciation get started and then get passed on from one man to another. We append here a list of a few of the words most commonly mispronounced. Check yourself and practice the correct forms.

Perform - the "e" comes first. Do not say preform.

Fidelity - both "i"s are short as in tin.

Naphtali - "ph" is the Greek ø and is pronounced like the "ph" in phone. Say Naf-ta-li. If you hear a "p" or "h" sound you're wrong.

Succoth - The "s" has a hissing sound. Do not say Zuccoth.

Zeredathah - There is no "i" in this word. The accent is on the syllable "da."

Fiat - The "i" is long as in fight.

Illustrated - Put the accent on the second syllable.

Inquiry - The first "i" is short and the second "i" long Accent on the second syllable. Say in-kwi-ri.

The Three Deserters - (whom we cannot spell out here). In order to differentiate among three such similar names many Masons place a very strong emphasis on the final syllable of each. This is incorrect. The accent is on the first syllable "Ju."

Apprise means notify or inform. Appraise means to evaluate. We use apprise in our ritual.

Beneficent - Do not say benificent. Bene is Latin for good or well, facio is "to do."

Defect - The accent is on the last syllable. Match it with defective.

Route - pronounce root not like ouch.

Divest short "i" Don't say die-vest, but rather di-vest with the accent on the second syllable.

Study the above and improve your English.
