M. A. Price's 6 ft. 4 frame served him well in athletics for he played football on Fresno State's first football team in 1922, then at Stanford under Pop Warner and was also Pacific Coast heavyweight collegiate boxing Champion in 1923.

His varied teaching experience was spent in Seattle, Mt. View, Fowler, Selma and ended with 21 years at Fresno High. Important presidencies were: National Ass'n. of Journalism Directors and the Fresno Teachers Association. He has long been an elder in the First Presbyterian Church.

Price was raised in Selma Lodge No. 277 in 1936, demitted to Las Palmas in 1941 and served as master in 1952. He was Worthy Patron of Fresno Chapter O. E. S. in 1950.

MASONIC HOME AT UNION CITY

There are 131 men and 174 women at the home, and in this there are 18 married couples. The average age is 82.14 years old. We have one guest who is 102 years old.

Once a year the East Bay Past Matron's Association conducts a "jam and jelly" day, where every one donates a little jam or jelly so that there will be sufficient supply to last a year.

We have two guests at Union City, and we are allowed six guests, if need be, due to the size of our lodge.

The average per member contributions to the Masonic Home varies from \$29.37 (California Lodge No. 1) to 65ϕ (Calayomi Lodge No. 282). Las Palmas average was \$2.06(1967) and this year it is close to \$2.25. The reason for the large average for Lodge No. 1 is that \$10,000 was left to the Masonic Home Endowment Fund by Duncan A. McLeod.

Total money received was \$1,023,145.30 for the year of 1967. Of this, \$268,265.94 are gifts and bequests and hte \$754,879.36 was received by the Board of Directors from the Lodges.

THE BOOKSHELF

The newly-made Master Mason is quite apt to feel abandoned, after the care, urging, and assistance given him in his previous work is withdrawn. Up to this point his problem has been to assimilate and digest new things presented to him on all sides. Suddenly he has been left quite alone with the realization that his new knowledge has raised more questions than it has provided answers. The questions he puts to his brethren of the lodge are not fully answered to his satisfaction. From my own memory I recall that it was a frustrating period. I firmly believe that it is the most critical time in a man's Masonic career. It is at this point that he will turn toward further knowledge, or in desperation leave, shrugging his shoulders and muttering, "Is that all?" To this brother I say, or better, shout, "NO! THAT IS NOT ALL!" There is more, much more. Finding it can be a bit of a problem however, and I propose to offer guide lines and a gentle fraternal nudge in the right direction for those who are seeking the road to Masonic light.

At the present time there is only one location in Fresno where a comprehensive collection of Masonic books is available. The Scottish Rite Temple at 1455 L Street in Fresno, has in its possession three combined libraries. They are the Harry F. White Memorial Library which is the property of the Scottish Rite Bodies; the Fresno Masonic Library Association Collection, which belongs jointly to five Fresno Blue Lodges (of which Las Palmas is one); and the Central California Research Lodge Library. There are over 500 volumes in the combined works. Most of the books may be borrowed by Master Masons in good standing. The loan period is approximately thirty days. There is no charge. The library is open on Monday nights when the Scottish Rite Bodies are meeting. The librarian is always there between 8:00 and 9:30 and frequently may be found in the area earlier and later. Tell the Tiler you're a Master Mason and that you want to go to the library. He may require you to show your dues card if he doesn't know you, but he will let you in.
