MASTER'S MESSAGE



My Brethren:

How many times have you met a brother who has not attended lodge for some time and heard him say, "I don't attend lodge anymore; I attended for a while after receiving my degrees, but after a time the degrees got kind of old and boring, etc."

Dewey H. Wollstein, Past Grand Master of Georgia, perhaps had the answer as to why some Masons do not attend lodge. The failures are those who believe that the ultimate attainment of some degree of spiritual improvement is not worth the steady application that is required to achieve it."

Attend lodge regularly this fall brethren, and when you do, listen closely - as you did when you were a candidate. Masonry will begin to glow anew in your hearts and shine forth in your lives!

THE HIGH TWELVE CLUB

This great movement was born in 1921 in Sioux Falls. Iowa by Edward C. Wolcott, Wally felt that Masons were hungry for Masonic fellowship and furthermore many were ineligible under the rigid classification system of the commercial luncheon clubs. From its inception High Twelve has added to its hour of happy fellowship the concept that Masons should put the tenets of the order into practical effect in the civic affairs of the community. High Twelve strictly conforms to all the requirements of each grand lodge under which it operates. There are many activities permitted to the clubs which are prohibited to chartered lodges. The chief emphasis of the organization is youth work. The Wolcott Foundation has already put 47 young people (mostly from Masonic families) through the graduate year at the George Washington University of Wash., D.C. in the school of government. These people are now serving the United States in the foreign service in counries all over the world. To detail its many Masonic services woud take more space than is available in this article.

The Fresno Club was chartered in March 1927. In its 41 years of existence, the many projects it has completed have reflected great credit upon Masonry. Currently each year a senior local DeMolay officer is sent (expenses paid) to the summer DeMolay Officers Training School. Of the 120 California boys attending last year's school at Asilomar, 82 were sent by the 74 California High Twelve Clubs.

The Fresno Club has never had the wholehearted support from local Masons that it richly deserves. Its influence would be magnified manyfold by doubling its membership. Many Masons could devote a noon hour a week to make Masonry a more vital force in the life of this city and at the same time as a free bonus enjoy good programs, good meals and relaxation with some choice men.

The dues are reasonable, \$12 a year. Compare with \$50-\$72 in other clubs. No classifications. All Master Masons are welcomed. Come to the Fresno Hotel on a Tuesday noon at 12:10 and inform President Havrilla that you'd like to be a Masonic booster.

MASONIC BIBLE PRESENTATION

I would like to call to your attention to some of the things pertaining to the book that lies open upon the altar, The Holy Bible.
