THE SECRETARY SEZ . . .

Gather around my Brethren, I wish to tell you about a little experience I have had —

"I fell asleep the other night,
And while I had my snooze,
I dreamed each member stepped right up
And promptly paid his dues.

But when I found 'twas but a dream, It made me feel very blue. So now, my brethren, it's up to you — To make this dream come true.

This little old dream, was primarily my concern for the members who are now delinquent; some of them being for two years, which is in violation of our Code and By-laws. At our annual meeting on December 18, 1969; — one of the reports I must make to the Lodge is on delinquent dues. For general information to all, I wish to advise you of the following which confronts me and the Lodge:

OUR BY-LAWS, ARTICLE 9, SECTIONS 2 AND 3

Section 2 — No member, who shall be in arrears for dues at the time of the annual election, shall be permitted to vote, or shall be eligible to any office; but such disqualification shall not apply to a member whose dues have been remitted at any time within 1 year previous to the annual election.

Section 3 — Should any member, suspended for nonpayment of dues, neglect for the period of two years to pay said dues or have the same remitted by his Lodge, said member may be restored to good standing only as provided by Section 260 of the Ordinances.

Masonic Code No. 579 - Section B: — The Secretary must send statements at least quarterly to those whose dues are not paid. (This I have done) It is mandatory that the Secretary notify those delinquent twelve months (This I am doing again now) and that at the next Stated Meeting the Master declare suspended those who have not paid, unless the Lodge remit their dues or extend time for a definite period expiring on a Stated Meeting date, at which time the Master or the Lodge must suspend, remit or grant further time.

Make my responsibilities easier my brethren — Let me hear from you now. Particularly to those delinquents, if

you are unable to restore yourself to good standing at this time, let me know so I may be governed accordingly in my annual report to the Lodge - it is most important to you that you do so.

The last thing your Lodge or any other one wishes to do, is to suspend any member. Our Masonic Code and By-laws must however be adhered to.
