DeMolay's constant slogan is that no DeMolay shall ever fail as a citizen, a leader or a man. The record is markedly clear tha our DeMolay boys live up to this motto.

Love, Religion, Nature, Immortality, Fidelty, Patriotism and Service are the tenets of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls. Founded in April 1922 by the Reverend William Mark Sexson, a distinguished Oklahoma Freemason, Rainbow for Girls fosters a love for humanity and our Rainbow Girls possess the finest attributes of womanhood.

EARL VANDERBURGH was born in Fresno in the year 1931, with Dr. C. M. Vanderburgh, an uncle, as the attending physician. Having lived on several ranches as a boy where his father was a grain farmer, he attended four different elementary schools in Clovis and Madera, was finally graduated from Friant elementary. Dividing his high school years between Clovis and Madera, he was very active in sports and The Future Farmers of America. Football, baseball and boxing

were priority sports. In his senior year he won the Star State Farmer Award for his small herd of Hereford cows and band of Hampshire sheep. Ever hear of a cattle sheep combination? This distinction earned an all expense paid trip to the National Future Farmers convention in Kansas City.

College involved two years at Modesto Jr. College and three years later received an AB degree from Fresno State College. During this time many important events took place. First, his marriage to the charming and lovely Mary Ann Ryan, a neighboring cattleman's daughter from the ghost mining town of Hildrith near O'Neals. The H. M. Vanderburghs, father of Bro. Earl, own the famed 101 Ranch and later built the 101 Ranch Store.

In 1952 they were blessed with a daughter, Cindi, who is a junior at McLane now and a past Honored Queen of Bethel No. 243 of the Order of Job's Daughters. Two years later a son Jake arrived and also now attends McLane Hi. Three years later still another son, Stan, arrived and attends Wishon Elementary.

His teaching career started in 1954 at Sun Empire Elementary near Kerman. He later became vice principal and P. E. director there. Three years later he moved to Powers Elementary in the then Bullard School District. Three years later he was called to Irwin Jr. High where he spent six years as Physical Education Instructor and Athletic Coach under the principal "Stoney" Johnston who was his high school coach. For the past 4 years he has been at Ft. Miller Jr. High fulfilling the same duties and coaching baseball.

His hobbies are many - hunting, fishing, horses and all sports including boating and camping for which he built his own camper. Carpentry is also an interesting subject. He builds almost all of his own projects and he and his family also have a small cattle ranch above Millerton Lake where he raises Hereford cows.

YORK RITE

The Blue Lodge, with its basic symbolic degrees, is supplemented by either the York Rite or Scottish Rite for further light in Masonry, and there are three bodies which comprise the York Rite.

You learned early in your Masonic career that Masonry was a progressive science taught by degrees. It is therefore in order that you should take advantage of every opportunity for self improvement, and the Blue Lodge, together with three bodies of York Rite, form an aggregate whole which provides the only complete understanding of ancient craft masonry.

The Blue Lodge is basic and indispensable and the foundation of all masonry, for the degrees of the Blue Lodge, Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Mason comprise the beginning, but not the ultimate in Masonic knowledge. Just as it might be said that the ABCs are the stepping stones for all higher learning.

Advanced learning is illucidated in the York Rite Bodies, through the Chapters of Royal Arch Masons, Councils of Select Masters and by Commandaries of Knights Templar.

The harmonious relationship which exists between these various bodies further enhances the several degrees and orders as are exemplified by these bodies, thereby completing the beautiful story of Free Masonry, which had its beginning in the Blue Lodge.

In the Entered Apprentice degree, one begins his labors before an unfinished temple — the great edifice being erected by King Solomon, and the abiding place of the Most High God. From there, he advances into the Fellow-craft degree, still laboring before that unfinished temple. In the Master Mason degree, he approaches, but does not achieve, the completion of the temple, thereby leaving the symbolic degrees with the temple yet unfinished, and the Great Truth of Free Masonry not yet revealed to him, save by a substitute.

Starting into a Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, the Mark Master degree, had it been arranged chronologically, could well be within the lodge system because in the Mark Master degree the workman is still laboring on this grand uncompleted edifice. The Mark Master degree is one of the most important and is believed to be the oldest of Masonic degrees and considered one of the most beautiful in all Free Masonry. It amplifies the Fellowcraft degree and contains

lessons of value in all walks of life, portrays the Encouraging Truth, that though we are often misunderstood, under-rated and traduced, there is one who will make the rejected stone the head of the corner.

It explains the manner in which ancient operative craftsmen were known and distinguished in receiving their wages, and derives its name from the Order of Mark Masters or an advanced class of Fellowcrafts who each possessed an individual mark by which their work was designated. Thus in the Mark Master degree a candidate is taught to work honestly and industriously, laying claim only to that which is his just due, and receiving nothing except that which is deserved. It's lessons are those of Honor, Justice and Truth.

The Past Master degree again brings us back to the Master Mason degree, and as a Master Mason his relation to the temple is unchanged. This degree was once a part of the symbolic degrees of the Blue Lodge and originally was conferred only on those who had served as Masters of a Masonic Lodge and is truly a sublime ritual of mental and spiritual preparation for the earnest seeker of further light in masonry. Those receiving the degree are designated as virtual past masters as distinguished from actual past masters. There is an indispensable prerequisite to exaltation in the Royal Arch degree, and the candidate is taught that he must first learn to obey before he can rule, and to govern himself before he can govern others.

In the most excellent masters degree in the York Rite system, he sees as he sees no where else in Free Masonry the completion, furnishing and dedication of the temple by Solomon, King of Israel.

He then comes to the Royal Arch degree, which has a little different and broader concept of Free Masonry, but still has to do with the temple, the weary journey to Babylon, the years of captivity and the return to Jerusalem to rebuild on the site of the ruins of the first temple a second temple.

This degree comprises a complete story of Jewish history in some of its darkest hours Primarily it is based on the subject of love of home and country, its lessons thus being of service and fortitude, which teaches the ultimate triumph of truth over all forms of superstition and error, proper respect for the Deity and his works, and the worship of one God under whatsoever name he may be worshipped.

In Royal Arch degrees the priceless secret of a master mason is revealed to him. Here the thought, work and all that is symbolically signified is made known to him. This degree therefore is indispensable to every earnest seeker of masonic light and he who attains it is truly exalted.
