

Masonic funeral services were conducted for ALBERT GEORGE McCLELLAN who died October 26, 1969. He was born December 25, 1897 in Texas and had lived in Fresno since childhood.

Bro. George joined Las Palmas in 1924. He also belonged to the Scottish Rite and the Tehran Temple.

He is survived by his wife, Minnie, and by a daughter, Sue Mancarini and two grandchildren. I want to share with you some thoughts on Masonry in California. We can be proud of our Masonry - proud in the knowledge that we are in the vanguard in Masonic programs and activities.

We have constructed a magnificient edifice, our Grand Lodge on top of Nob Hill, the most prominent place in San Francisco. This shining white marble Temple, because of your efforts, is debt free, and is a constant reminder that ours is a Fraternity of substance, that it is permanent, and that it will always have the most prominent place in our hearts.

We have provided for our unfortunate Brethren, their widows and orphans, two of the finest facilities which brotherly love can produce. Our home for the elderly at Union City, and our home for children at Covina. We contribute money each year to our endowment fund to assist in the ever increasing costs of maintenance of these two splendid Homes.

We actively engage in support of our public schools, and sponsor programs dedicated to the preservation of our Constitution. We provide leadership and moral support for our youth orders of DeMolay, Rainbow for Girls, and Job's Daughters.

We are continually building new Temples, as well as refurbishing and renovating existing Lodge halls. Here is ample evidence that we are successfully engaged in Masonic endeavors, and our sister jurisdictions have noted, and commented favorably, on the scope and variety of our many activities. But today's changing world, as successful as we are, and as great as we believe we are, Masonry is faced with its most formidable and crucial challenge, - the survival of free public education, the cornerstone of our Liberty, the foundation stone of our Republic.

The time has come for you and I as Masons, to take a good hard look at what is happening to the public schools in our country, and particularly in our State. Our public schools are undergoing attack from well organized, minority groups of revolutionary anarchists, whose wanton acts of senseless violence have reached a new depth of depravity. Shamefully enough, in this category California is also in the vanguard. We need to be reminded that it was the filthy speech movement at Berkeley, unchecked by those in authority, which emboldened its perverted degenerates to further acts of vulgarity, - acts which are continuing to plague this great University.

We need to be reminded that the cancerous machinations of these animalistic mobs, have caused hundreds of thousands of dollars of damage to our schools. Money which you and I will be forced to replace through increase taxes. We need to be aware of the fact that these lawless radicals have been successful in closing some of our schools, two of the most recent being George Washington Carver Junior High School and Jefferson High School both in the Los Angeles area. And they have succeeded in terrorizing and frightening our faculty members. In fact, at Southwest College, 47 of the 60 faculty members have requested transfer to other schools.

We need to be reminded that our faculties have been infiltrated with Atheists and Communists whose avowed parpose is to demoralize and destroy the religious and moral values of our youth. We need to awakened to the fact that these vandals, for the most part, are treated very leniently by our Judiciary. A case in point being the Judge who fined 35 hard-core sit-in demonstrators \$25.00 each. They took possession of the Los Angeles Board of Education offices for five days and their crimes consisted of., among others, physical assault and battery, arson, and destruction of public property in excess of \$35,000. The defense attorney told the judge that a community party was planned to raise money for paying the fines of the defendants. There was no announcement that a party has been planned to help the law abiding citizens of the community to defray the \$35,000 cost of restoring the damaged premises.

We need to be informed, that in Hayward, the Unified Teachers Associaton recently issued a bulletin — quote "Public Schools Week: Hayward Unified Teachers Association recommends that its members Not participate in activities of this week, such as decorating rooms, preparing special exhibits or programs, or attending scheduled open houses." unquote.

These are but a few examples of the violence, the terrorism and the many problems which threaten the very existence of our Public Schools.

In 1920, the then Grand Master, Most Worshipful Charles Albert Adams, noted with alarm that more than 18,0000 schools in the United States had been closed. In California, 600 were closed and there was a shortage of 1,200 teachers. Realizing the apathy of the general public, the Grand Master proclaimed Public Schools Week and requested that every Lodge hold a meeting which would be open to the public and at which conditions affecting the public schools were to be discussed.

This year, your Grand Master, like his predecessors in office, has issued a similar proclamation, and as Master Masons and members of a fraternity which have always

espoused the cause of our public schools, we have a duty and an obligation to perform.

Once again our public schools are threatened, and once again Masonry must meet the challenge! Masonry has always placed full responsibility on its individual members for the implementation of its desired goals. It is you and I, as individuals, who must get the job done, not our Lodges nor the Grand Lodge. You will never see a monument erected to a Grand Lodge or a constituent Lodge, but there are now, and will be in the future, many monuments erected to Masons as individuals. Masons as individuals have been involved in the formation and the maintenance of our public school system since its inception.

It was DeWitt Clinton, Grand Master of Masons in New York, acting as an individual, who was primarily responsible for the adoption by the State of New York, of a statewide system of public education - one of the first states to do so. Benjamin Franklin, Grand Master of Masons in Pennsylvania, acting as an individual, vigorously promoted and rallied support for the establishment of public schools in that state. Today, thousands of Masons are actively engaged in the noble task of educating our youth.

In California, you and I have a tremendous investment in our public schools. We have more students enrolled in schools than there are people in each of 38 states. More money is spent on their education than 46 other states appropriate for their entire budgets. We are building 10,000 new classrooms annually, which is more than twice as many as any other state. And 421/2 cents of every tax dollar is spent on education.

It should be self evident that if for no other than financial reasons, we should be alarmed and concerned about the present trend of events. We can no longer ignore the unpleasant reality, that in addition to burning, ravaging, and laying waste to the physical structures of our educational system, the preachers of anarchy, and the organized assassins of established institutions, have successfully infiltrated, and are now members of our faculties, where we have given them academic freedom to practice their insidious attacks upon the minds and the moral character of our nation's youth. As individuals, we must now stand up and be counted! As members of the heretofore silent majority, we must now become the vocal, concerned, and active majority. We must make it unmistakably clear that our substantial investment in our public schools and the youth of our country will not be allowed to "go down the drain."

More than 100 years ago the British Historian, Lord MacAulay, wrote this warning to an American friend: "Your Republic will be fearfully plundered and laid waste by barbarians in the 20th Century, as the Roman Empire was in the 5th, with this difference - that the Huns and Vandals will have been engendered within your own country by your own institutions."

My Brethren, THE HUNS AND VANDALS HAVE BEEN SPAWNED BY OUR OWN INSTITUTIONS!

They are burning and closing our schools - They are corrupting the minds and morals of our young people. It is happening in the United States - it is happening in California and it is happening here in this community. May God grant us the will to stir from our lethargy - the energy to activate our minds, our voices and our bodies, - and

the courage to persevere.
