We are proud of our membership and the peace and harmony that prevails in the Lodge and in our associations. We are pleased with the type of men that gain admission. This is good, for no doubt each of us has been told in our business enterprises that the success of any organization depends upon the type of people that comprise it, and that this is controlled in the employment and training program. So it is in Masonry, and our Lodge in particular though we have no recruiting program as industry does, we have rules and guidelines governing applicants, and our degrees and committee work comprise our training program.

That an applicant must have lived in this Grand Lodge Jurisdiction one year prior to applying for the degrees indicates his stability and allows us to check the records for his work and civic habits. That he must have resided within the Lodge Jurisdiction for six months prior, assures that acquaintances may be made, and gives members an opportunity to know the man and to determine whether they would choose to receive him as a member.

For to recommend an applicant is not a mere formality, but a personal pledge of Masonic honor to the Lodge, that in the opinion of the recommender. The applicant posesses the positive qualifications which will bring honor to Masonry. This is good assurance, for to do this, one must have known the man personally, or first made a careful investigation to ascertain if he was worthy. This should include having been in his home, knowing how he lives, his family attitude and responsibilities, and knowing his obligations and how he meets them. Knowing his business ethics and standing in the community and that he is well within the physical and moral qualifications also assures the recommender of the applicant's worthiness.

It is satisfying to know that when a member recommends the applicant, he wishes to call him brother and encourage him to share the mysteries of Masonry with him. That this is true, and that our screening and investigation committees are sincere and efficient, assures us that peace and harmony will continue to prevail.
