Grand Master McPhee at 416th District Breakfast

Our Grand Master said that 44%of the Masons in California gave the Homes \$840,000 in 1969. It costs \$21/2 million a year to operate them, so let's get our gifts and percentage from Las Palmas up as high as possible. He said that some brothers give also in the name of another who cannot make it - a very worthy example of Masonic Brotherhood.

Our Affilliated Youth Orders need our support as never before, and the support isn't necessarily all financial either. They need ideas, help and guidance in good youth projects to involve them in benefiting others and achieving pride of creativity and resourcefulness. One of his examples of this was a Chapter of Jobies who made pen-pals of guests in the Home, and promised to come and see them. Another Chapter contacted a Lodge's secretary and got a list of shut-ins advisable for them to write to or visit and really spread cheer. These are some of the ways they can endear themselves to others and it will bring them all of the support they deserve.


