MASTER'S MESSAGE



Brethren:

It is good that we look ahead to the coming months and notice what is important to us and plan to allow time to take part in the things we want to do, and know we should do. Each of the next three months has a significant Masonic activity and responsibility:

March 15-21 is YOUTH ORDERS WEEK. As you know, we are closely tied to five Masonic Affiliated Youth Groups, those which meet in Las Pal-

mas Temple. Technically, we sponsor Las Palmas Chapter Order of DeMolay, but greatly assist one Assembly International Order of Rainbow for Girls, and three Bethels, International Order of Job's Daughters. We are closely involved in each of these through those of our worthy Brothers who serve as officers or advisors to them, those of us who patronize their self-help fund raising projects, and in the 50% rental arrangement for the Temple space they occupy. It is the responsibility of all of us to attend one of their meetings during this week at least, to encourage them and let them know that we are interested.

April 20-24th is PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK, and the 50th anniversary of its founding. We believe that the Public Schools system is a strong factor in our country's greatness. It is possible that now is a crisis in its history which will determine its course and policy for the future. We are bound by our precepts to become involved in influencing its destination. Are you pleased with what is happening in our Public Schools today? Are you unhappy about some trend or permissiveness? Should there be additional source of revenue in funding its expenses besides your tax dollar? Look into these or other factors and become properly informed, and then let our Public School Administrators know your desires. They are hungry for your "feed back" and support. Plan ahead to make certain that you will have made your contribution by May 30th, the time of reckoning our faithfulness as a Lodge to support the two wonderful Masonic Homes in California. Our position on the Honor Roll is a gauge of our support. Try tasting the pleasure of giving an extra amount in the name of one who cannot make it.

So, my space is nearly gone. Usually reviews of our activities of the past month are given here, and praises sung to our industrious committee people. But this time it is all eyes front to the future - pledging ourselves to meet our obligations and responsibilities - Join me, will you?

BRO. WALLACE RAYMOND SCOTT was born in Pasadena, California July 27th, 1923. He attended the Pasadena City schools through the fourteenth grade. After a wartime interruption his schooling continued at Occidental College where he earned a B.A. degree and a general secondary teaching credential.

When he was thirteen he began the scouting trail he is still following. He was awarded the Eagle Scout badge with two palms, became Scout Master of his

church troop, a Vigil Honour member of Order of the Arrow and is now an Area Commissioner. He was recently awarded the Sequoia Medal for outstanding service to boys. Somewhere in his teens he found time to be a DeMolay.

He entered the armed services in 1943 as a combat infantryman in the Pacific Theatre where he acquired a Purple Heart and considerable hospital time. After finishing school he was employed by Consolidated Engineering for two years. After seven and a half years of professional scouting as district executive, he turned again to teaching and is now employed by the McKinley Roosevelt School District as a teacher of U.S. history and civics.

He and his lovely wife Helen have two children, Susan, 13 and Robert, 11. The family attends St. Luke's Methodist Church where they are very active. He lists among his hobbies camping, stamp collecting, carving and gardening.

Bro. Scott became an entered apprentice Mason on January 7, 1967 and was raised to Master Mason July 13, 1967. Last year he headed the refreshment committee. Welcome Bro. Scott. Look to the Book and point the way.

"A Broad Platform"

"On Masonic Funerals"

Brethre ::

"It has been a custom among the Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons, from time immemorial, at the request of a departed brother or his family, to assemble in the character of Masons and, with the solemn formalities of the Craft, to offer up to his memory, before the world, the last tribute of our affection."

This, as you may know, is the first part of the Masonic funeral service. The entire service, when properly rendered and attended, is a wonderful experience. It is most satisfying, both to the bereaved family and friends, and to ourselves for properly paying this final fraternal tribute to the memory of a departed brother.

As it says, "before the world," and this is so, it obligates us all to put our best foot forward, live up to our obligations to each other, help to comfort the family, and

make the service worthy of the Masonic name.

The main service takes 20 to 25 minutes, and if there is to be the committal at the grave, this takes about 5 minutes. A small part of our day, but a most worthy part. Weigh the satisfaction of doing your part against the feeling of unfulfilled desire in not doing it.

When there is to be a graveside service, usually the family requests that brethren of the Lodge be pallbearers. Bro. Arch Addington, P.M. has been most helpful in arranging

for them.

I would like to have each of you who are able to serve as pallbearers to notify Arch, or our secretary, Bro. Norm Foley, so a record can be kept and enable more brethren to share this responsibility. You will be pleased that you did, and I will be grateful to you.

Masonic aprons are always available at Masonic funeral services. You are expected to wear one when in attendance.

I, as Master, and Brother Pope as chaplain do our best to render the service properly. Your attendance will make it much more meaningful and comforting to the bereaved family. Ed Carpenter, Master
