SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA

September 25, 1970

TO ALL MASTERS:

For your guidance in working with DeMolay, Job's Daughters and Rainbow for Girls, you are advised as follows:

A Masonic Lodge in this jurisdiction may individually, or collectively with other Masonic Lodges, SPONSOR a DeMolay Chapter.

By SPONSOR is meant, the Lodge and its members may:

- 1 Make funds available, when necessary, to DeMolay from Lodge Refreshment Fund.
- 2 Help to arrange meeting place for DeMolay Chapter.
- 3 Provide guidance provide leadership. The most important single item our youth groups must have is interested Masons. The Lodge should meet this need.
- 4 Set up a band combo - develop athletic activities in the Chapter.
- 5 Assist in teaching DeMolay ritual.
- 6 Assist in arranging social programs and provide supervision.
- 7 Attend and encourage others to attend DeMolay degrees.

- 8 Have DeMolay degrees portrayed in your Lodge for your Lodge members and other interested Masons.
- 9 Form a Youth Committee in your Lodge and have the committee report at each stated meeting. This was the subject of a recommendation of the Special Committee on Youth Orders at the 1969 Annual Communication.
- 10 Write about the DeMolay Chapter activities in your bulletin or trestle board.
- 11 Many other worthwhile things.

Although much of the foregoing, including the use of Refreshment Funds for all Masonically affiliated Youth Organizations, applies to Job's Daughters and Rainbow for Girls, actual sponsorship by Lodges is limited to DeMolay.

It is the fervent hope of your Grand Master that all constituent Lodges will participate as fully as possible in our needed work with youth. Nothing is more important - nothing is more rewarding.

If your Lodge is not large enough to sponsor a Chapter, talk it up at the next district meeting. Perhaps another Lodge or two will join with you. You'll be glad you did.

Mt. Rushmore National Memorial . . Carved By Masons

Gutzon Borglum, (John Gutzon de la Mothe Borglum, 1871-1941) sculptor and painter, best known for the gigantic Mt. Rushmore carving in the Black Hills of South Dakota. Previous to this he designed and began carving the Confederate Memorial on the face of Stone Mountain, Georgia, but a controversy arose with association and he destroyed all plans and models.

He officially started the Mt. Rushmore National Memorial on August 10, 1927, when President Coolidge dedicated it. He lived to see the fourth head unveiled in 1939 - but not to complete the work - which was done by his son, Lincoln. Borglum was an active Mason and Master of his Lodge, Howard No. 35, New York City, 1910-11.

Lincoln Borglum, son of Gutzon, born 1912, was in charge of measurements and enlarging models of the Memorial and following the death of his father was assigned to complete it. member of Battle River Lodge No. 92. Hermosa, South Dakota.
