# "Making A Mason At Sight"

In those jurisdictions in which the Grand Master possesses the power to make a Mason "at sight", the process is for him to assemble at least the statutory number of brethren, form them into an Emergent Lodge for the existence of which he gives a dispensation, then give a second dispensation to that Emergent Lodge to omit the statutory time between petition and initiation, and finally, and third a dispensation to omit the statutory time between degrees. This having been done, the candidate is initiated, passed and raised, all in one evening. He becomes an unaffiliated Mason, and must apply to a Lodge and pass the ballot for affiliation.
