# PROCLAMATION CONSTITUTION OBSERVANCE MONTH

At the Constitutional Convention of 1787, held nearly 200 years ago, a document unique in the history of mankind was engrossed on parchment. There were thirty-nine signers of our Constitution and twenty-three were Freemasons. Since that time the fabric of our Nation has been woven with the golden threads of Masonry always evident, creating a tapestry that has been the centerpiece of admiration by people of all nations.

The basic principles of Freemasonry and the basic principles of our Constitution are inseparable. The members of our Fraternity played an important part in the creation of

the United States of America.

Today, more than any other time in our history, the Masons of California should be vitally concerned with conditions that exist in our Nation. Certain elements are actively engaged in an attempt to destroy our Constitution and our form of government. Each of us, as Masons and as Americans, must be constantly vigilant to fight for and protect the freedoms granted to us by our forefathers.

I, therefore, designate the month of September 1975 as Constitution Observance Month and direct every Lodge in this Jurisdiction to actively engage in a meaningful patriotic program during the month. Each program should be well-planned in advance and encourage public attendance and participation.

I further direct that this Proclamation be read at the August and September Stated Meetings and, wherever possible, be reprinted in Lodge bulletins for September 1975.
