

The other day I was at the home of one of our newer brothers and we started to discuss Las Palmas. I was very pleased to hear this brother say that he missed attending Las Palmas during the summer. Although he attended the dinner and stated meetings, this was not enough.

When I took my degrees in 1967 and 1968 there were usually 4 or 5 first or second degrees on a given evening. Lodge started at 7 p.m. and closed about 11 p.m. I am advised that during the 1940's and 1950's it was not uncommon to have three third degrees conferred on a particular day.

SECRETARY'S SECTION

There are still a number of members who do not understand making donations to the Masonic Homes Endowment Fund. We get check made out to the Masonic Home and the bank gives us trouble when we try to deposit them.

All money sent to the lodge for designated purposes should be made out to Las Palmas Lodge and down in the lower left corner there is a space for writing in the purpose of the money. Please use it and it will get to the place you intend it to go.

Everything we receive is deposited to our checking account and then at the end of the month is forwarded in a lump sum to the place you have told us you want it to go.

If you make donations to the Masonic Homes Endowment Fund at the same time you pay your dues, we assume any amount over the \$30.00 is a donation to the Homes fund and is set aside for that purpose.

We are happy to announce that this year you members have averaged a little over \$4.00 each in contributions. This does not mean that every member made a contribution. Some of our more generous memebrs have sent in large amounts which covered those who sent in nothing—or small donations.

In 1978 382 members contributed \$4,035.00, which averaged \$4.28 for each member, based on our membership of 942. This figures out to 41% of the members actually making contributions.

We would like to let the members know that the secretary's office is operating under almost the same conditions as other offices in the world. We often make mistakes. If you get a bill for dues which have already been paid, please let us know so we can straighten it out. Twice this year dues reminders were sent to members who already paid.

The cornerstone laying for the new Charles Sedam Center at the Masonic Home, Union City, will be held on Saturday, October 6, 1979, at 2:30 p.m. All members who will be in San Francisco early for the annual Grand Lodge Communication, and who wish transportation to the Home, should let the lodge secretary know.

Tickets will be issued to those attending, which will be free and will be good for a free lunch in the Exhibit Hall (G floor) at Grand Lodge and also for bus transportation to the Home. They will be sent in advance of the ceremony date to lodge secretaries who will distribute them to those who order them. Deadline for ordering "courtesy tickets" is September 15. Those not having courtesy tickets will not be able to obtain the two free items.

Members driving to the Home must park across Mission Blvd. and a shuttle bus will transport them to the Home and return to their cars. No parking will be allowed on the Home grounds.

Buses will leave from in fron of the Memorial

Temple at 1:10 p.m. and will leave the Home on their return trip at 4:00 p.m.
