# Reservations by Wednesday Noon — Or Else!

A letter was enclosed with the Aug.-Sept. Trestleboard to all Fresno area members pleading with them to make sure they have reservations for all dinners at the lodge. We have heard numerous remarks that this letter did not set strong enough penalties for failure to observe simple courtesies.

Our ladies plan dinners a month or more in advance, and it is imperative that they know how many are going to be fed. Several times the Dates have lost money because the number they anticipated did not show up to eat.

At our August stated meeting dinner there was available a sheet which those desiring to be on the "permanent" list signed up for automatic reservations hereafter. Those who did not sign must call in reservations for

future dinners or they may not have food to eat. All previous lists of "permanent" reservations have been discarded and only this last one is in effect.

All "permanent" reservations must call and cancel their dinners if they will be absent. There is a great possibility a bill for the reserved meals will be sent if this is not done. Cancelling a future dinner does not remove a name from the "permanent" list. You will be expected to attend future dinners if you have not notified us in advance you will be absent.

The Dates purchase food Wednesday afternoon and prepare it Thursday morning, and it takes all day Thursday to cook and set the tables. It will be out of the question to accept reservations or cancellations after Wednesday noon. If you have not arranged a reservation or cancellation before then, we just simply cannot accommodate you.

# Invite Sojourners to Become Members

Members of Las Palmas Lodge should inquire around their neighborhoods and learn if some of their good friends are members of lodges in other areas and invite them to attend a meeting. Sometime a little encouragement from you will be all that is needed to help a brother start attending. We are sure they will appreciate it.

If the neighbor complains he hasn't been to lodge for a number of years and is fearful of not being able to pass an examination for admission, he should be assured our lodge is not harsh with friendly visitors. All we need to know is enough to assure a committee that a member desires admission and he remembers enough of the work to indicate he has indeed taken the three degrees.

Occasionally a visit by a sojourner leads to affiliation. It is always better to be affiliated with a lodge near a permanent address. About half of the masonic members in Fresno County are now members of local lodges, some as far away as Colorado and Alabama. Such lodge members are doing themselves a

disservice by not associating themselves with local lodges. If they should need assistance, they are so far away from their home lodges it is almost impossible to help them when it is urgent.

The Masonic Service Bureau in this area is very efficient in matters pertaining to so-journers, but permission must be obtained from his home lodge before help can be given. This involves wasted time, and the service is not always the same as that rendered by local lodges, especially when a brother becomes ill or hospitalized. It is difficult to hear about these problems because there is no local connection.

A descreet inquiry around your neighborhood may produce results that will create a lasting friendship and at the same time gain another member for your lodge.
