## From the East:

The Holiday season is once again upon us. It is a time to look back upon the labors of the year and reflect upon the activities of the past 12 months. Hopefully, what you'll see is a year filled with happiness and joy; a year where the good times far outweighed the bad; a year in which your commitment to the ideals of Freemasonry grew and prospered.



This year has been one of great joy and happiness for me. The privilege of serving my Lodge as its Master has been a great challenge. There have been ups and downs, but the overall experience has been one that can never be surpassed. I sincerely believe that this organization of friends and Brothers can make an impact on the lives of men. The ideals taught in our degree work are the foundation needed to live an upright, purposeful life. Perhaps the greatest joy I have experienced these past 8 years as an officer has been the opportunity to assist in imparting these ideals to those 100 or so individuals who have knocked at Masonry's door.

When I began planning my term as Master some 18 months ago, I made an assessment of the Lodge operations and activities as I saw them, and formulated my year accordingly. It was brought to my attention that there were few social activities of interest for the new, younger members that were joining our Order. Realizing that need, the April trip to Lake Tahoe was planned, as was the Deep Sea Fishing Trip in August. Another thing that bothered me was the fact that many of our members were coming to our Stated Meeting dinners, but few were walking across the lobby into the meeting after eating. Input from the members indicated that their wives did not enjoy "sitting and doing nothing" while their husbands were in Lodge. Thus the ladies' programs were begun, and we saw an immediate and significant increase in attendance at our business meetings. These items are just a couple of illustrations of how minor changes can bring major results. If you see a need for change in your Lodge, I urge you to contact the incoming Master, and bring ideas to his attention. As your leader, he has a desire to plan the activities that you would like to

see in the next year. Speak Up! He'll listen.

One of my goals this year was to realize a net gain in membership for our Lodge. First the Good News. Relative to our Membership status as of November 15, I am pleased to say that we have Initiated 20, Passed 13 and Raised 13. In addition, we have gained 8 members through affiliation. And now the Bad News. We have lost 21 members by death, 4 by demit and 7 by suspension. This means that at the present time, we are showing a net loss in membership for the year. However, comparing this year with years past, the new loss is substantially reduced. Brethren, your efforts at obtaining new members have paid off. Maybe by the end of next year we will indeed be able to show a net gain in membership.

Three special events will occur at the stated meeting this month. First and foremost will be the annual election of officers. At this meeting we will choose those who are to lead Las Palmas in the ensuing year. Remember, you must have a current dues receipt in order to vote. Secondly, our annual Necrology service will be held on this evening. This is a time when we stop and remember those Brethren who have passed to the Celestial Lodge during 1984. Third, we will have our annual Christmas dinner where we as a Lodge can share the joys of the Season. And don't forget, Santa Claus will make his annual visit to Las Palmas and will have goodies for those children in attendance.

Serving as Master of Las Palmas Lodge has been a rare privilege. I would like to take this opportunity to thank John Reynolds, PM for giving me the chance to serve as an officer when a vacancy occurred during his term as Master. In a Lodge of 850 members, and with only one appointment to the "line" made each year, I realize that, at age 32, I am indeed "lucky" to have had this opportunity. I thank all of you for your support this past year, and look forward to many years of fellowship with Las Palmas. Thanks again!!
