From the Secretary

Several members have asked about those little round stickers that Grand Lodge issued last year with dues cards. We now have a supply on hand and can fill all orders and requests for additional Masonic emblems for the rear window of your cars.



Grand Lodge charged us 25c each for them and

you can get them for that price by sending your money to the lodge office or pick them up any morning before noon.

It has come to our knowledge that several members wish to drop out of the lodge and are trying to do so by not paying dues. This is not the correct way of terminating membership.

Members should request a demit while their dues are still current and withdraw in good standing. Non-payment of dues will require that a member be suspended after being in arrears for more than a year.

Perhaps the cause of dropping out is financial hardship. This should not happen. When the lodge learns a Brother is in difficulty with finances not of his own making, it has been a custom to remit dues until he is again able to pay.

This method keeps the member in good standing until he is again able to take care of his dues himself. The only other way a member can guit a lodge is by death. This latter one we do not recommend. Just call the lodge office before noon any working day and give us your problem. We'll probably be able to help you.

If you should happen to change your address, don't forget to notify the lodge office. Don't tell the Grand Lodge or California Freemason. It only delays the change. They get the notes and send them back to the lodge which takes several months before we find out you have moved.

IN LOVING APPRECIATION

This reminds me of one of the times I took 10 year old son John on one of my field trips. We stopped at a restaurant for supper. He saw a meal on the menu he liked, that Mother often made, and ordered it. He said, "This looks the same as Mother makes, but this isn't very good — I can hardly eat it — Why?" I told him the difference is the tender loving care Mothers use in cooking for us at home. And what a difference it does make!

A familiar precept advocating the benefits of Love is in our Chaplain's prayer from 1st Corinthians, substituting the word LOVE for CHARITY, as done in recent versions of the Bible: (in part) — "and have not LOVE, I am nothing; — and have not LOVE, it profitith me nothing; LOVE suffereth long, and is kind; LOVE envieth not; LOVE vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil; rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in the truth; beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things. And now abideth faith, hope, LOVE, these three; but the greatest of these is LOVE."
