Grand Master John W. Driskell informs us that the Grand Lodge has reached 80% of its goal of \$1,000,000 toward restoration of the Statue of Liberty next year, when it is dedicated in July.

Masons financed and dedicated the base on which the Statue stands. A dedicated French mason donated the statue. Now the masonic fraternity is actively trying to restore the famous lady.
