Masonic Information and Education

Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty

We learn in the First Degree of Masonry that a Masonic Lodge is metaphorically said to be supported by three great pillars, Wisdom, Strength and Beauty. We realize that it takes Wisdom to plan, design, and construct. We recognize that there are many standards, codes, and prior examples of success and failure to govern and guide the architect. Strength has formulas for stress, bearing weights, strength of materials, and placement of members. But, what about Beauty? How is it governed or measured? Are there standards or laws for it to assure success and acceptance?

First, we must agree on what Beauty is. One definition is, "Beauty is that which arouses an admiring pleasure to the senses". The word "Aesthetics" is similar and is derived from the Greek, meaning "perceptible to the senses." And we refer to the five senses of human nature, of course. For the purpose of this discussion, let's concentrate on the sense of seeing. There are adages like, "A thing of Beauty is a joy forever", "Beauty is in the eyes of the beholder", and many others. Beauty is abstract, governed mainly by public acceptance, and strongly influenced by comparison to the symetry and order found in nature.

Some theories assuring Beauty are:

Organic Beauty. A structure has Organic Beauty when it gives the impression that it is suitable to the use intended. An example might be the supports for a porch roof. Whereas two 4" steel pipes could support it, but doesn't look like it would, two or more Ionic or Corinthian pillars in proper proportion look strong enough and are more ornate and pleasing.

The Gestalt Theory. This refers to the illusion that the whole must appear to be simpler than the sum of the parts. A car's body, fenders, and hood conceal the intricate working parts, or the walls and roof of a building conceal the structural members, and can be proportioned to be pleasant.

Performed Impressions. These vary with the

individual, but often with people at large. They are based on prior experiences or associations which influenced people's likes and dislikes, as to the form, color, or usefulness. A house built to look like a red barn would probably lack beauty to many, as they associate a red barn with draftiness, cold, and discomfort.

The early Greeks used Geometry, proportion, and colors to advantage. The structures in which they incorporated the "root rectangles", "golden mean proportion", symetry and order, and purposeful colors, were widely accepted as having Beauty, and have stood the test of time.

So, let us concentrate on Wisdom to contrive, Strength to support, and Beauty to adorn our undertakings — and —
