Las Palmas Lodge Members Salute PAUL CHANDLER SHELLEY

Lodge Organist - 1956 to 1987

Brother Paul Chandler Shelley, Organist for Las Palmas Masonic Temple for the past 31 years, was feted at pre-Stated Meeting Ceremonies, February, 19, 1987, for his zeal, fidelity, and attachment to the Lodge and the Community.

Brother Paul has chosen to retire from his duties as Lodge Organist for a well

deserved rest. His faithful presentation of musical interludes during the rituals of the degrees added appropriate climate and moods to accentuate the importance of the degree activity. One had only to witness degrees without his playing to realize the emptiness, and to wish he were there. His piano playing and Brother Dale Orr's directing songs at the "Dinners with Our Dates" for those with Birthdays or Anniversaries has been a pleasure to all.

His service to the community has been praiseworthy too. He was an Instructor in our Public Schools, having served at Edison and Hoover High Schools, teaching Music, History, and English. He has been choir director and organist at the Lutheran Cross Church, the Woodland St. Lukes Episcopal Church, and the Unity Church. He has also been Organist for Fresno Masonic Lodge No. 247.

This is not the first time his outstanding services to Masonry and the Community have been recognized. He was awarded the coveted "Hiram Award" at Las Palmas Lodge, October 18, 1979, which is only awarded once a year in a Masonic Lodge when there is a Brother worthy of such high esteem. Brother Paul was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in Las Palmas Lodge, April 12, 1945.

Brother Shelley was born May 14, 1905, in Keswich, Michigan (making him nearly 82 years old), one of eleven children. He earned an AB degree at USC, and a MA degree at New Mexico State University, majoring in Music and English, with Minor Studies in History and Education as a basis for his teaching credentials. He and his devoted wife Charlotte were married in July, 1930 (57 years ago). It is a pleasure to see her ardent support of his many activities. They have two sons, William and

Robert, who have provided them with four granddaughters, and two great-granddaughters. Son William became Paul Shelley's Lodge Brother by being raised a Master Mason in Las Palmas Lodge, December 10, 1959.

The Lodge ceremony was highlighted by the Las Palmas Lodge Officers who presented them with a beautiful miniature grand piano music box, properly inscribed, which plays the tune, "Memories".
