#### The Whole Is No Better Than Its Parts

Installation is now over and done with for another year. The officers are settled in their stations and abiding by their duties. Las Palmas Lodge is started on its way to what we expect will be a successful year. Not just for the Lodge itself, but for the new members in their search for light.

There is an important segment that we must have in addition to filling the stations. That segment consists of the side-liners and the committees. The Master, with the help of his officers, has set up and appointed committees. Most of these working bodies are vital to the overall success of the masonic year; they are all necessary parts of smoothly

operating machine.

Administratively, the audit, finance, delinquent dues, and the Masters advisory, are very improtant and should be constantly active and seeking answers and ways to improve the overall operations. Relief, sickness, funeral, necrology and widows club committees are humanitarian. They are of utmost importance, for here we are dealing with emotions, grief, distress, physical as well as mental considerations. In the case of funeral services we should not forget that we are concerned with two obligations. First is our duty and honor to the departed Brother. Secondly, we must be tactful, courteous, proficient and considerate to all parties concerned. Relief and sickness committees must function as demanded. To aid and assist a worthy brother, his widow and orphans is a mandate, and must be observed whenever the occasion arises. Our widows, bless them, are entitled to our loving support and we must not fail them.

Applicant screening, candidate coaching and masonic education are each vital in their individual way. The screening is important in two ways. It eliminates the embarrassment of a possible dissenting vote, and it can implant a favorable impression in the mind of the applicant. It can identify the every day application of the science of Freemasonry, and help to remove some of the cob-webs in the mind of the applicant. His coaching is an important and obviously vital part in his advancement. Proper coaching

involves more than memorizing.

It is a special opportunity for the coach to impart masonic knowledge he might not otherwise receive. The candidates' understanding of Masonry as a needed and worthwhile institution can more easily be gained by the time spent with knowledgeable and dedicated coach. He can help to remove and lift the veils of allegory and symbolism contained in the lectures.

Masonic information, history and degree education should be a regular part of the lodge's planned programs for the year. These programs are not only beneficial to the new mason but can be interesting to the masons of long standing. There are no limits or boundaries to the practical application of the philosophical and ritualistic aspects of the science of Freemasonry.

Side-liners can play a large part of Lodge work by substituting in many parts of the work. The officers of the lodge are ready and willing to assist a brother who wishes to become active on degree nights. It's a great way to become a worker in the quaries of masonry and help build the temple and be among the other workmen.

Finally, Brethren, become a contributing part of Las Palmas Lodge; accept responsibility. If you are not on a committee or a working side-liner, let an officer know that you want to help. You will not only be helping the lodge but you will be helping yourself by being a practicing mason and a cog in the drive wheels of a successful lodge.
