A Formula For Success Craft Masonry

I am reminded of the excellent admonition offered by Grand Commander C. Fred Kleinknect, 33° in the June 1989 issue of the Scottish Rite Journal, "The whole structure of Freemasonry is based on the Symbolic Lodge It is here that good men learn the ideals of our order. Here they catch the fervor of Freemasonry. Here they learn from their Brethren just what it really is to be a Mason."

That is, of course, an axiom beyond question. All the fundamentals of leading the good and proper life are incorporated in the work and ritual of the three Degrees of Masonry. However, to have received these degrees and/or to have worked in them, **does not** assure the assimilation of all that which Masonry has to offer. We must accept and believe, practice and study, apply and live by, all that which has been laid before us. Then and only then will we fully understand exactly what is meant by the sublimity; the high moral, ethical and intellectual station to which we may rise; the Sublime Degree of Master Mason.

So Mote It Be These are th

These are the final words of Regius Poem, which is the oldest written record (1390) still extant, referring to Masonry. Mote, is an old English word (Chaucerian) meaning, may. Masons have used this phrase since the beginning of written history of the Craft. It brings the sanctity of age to the ritual from ancient days to modern times.

PROCLAMATION U.S. CONSTITUTION OBSERVANCE MONTH September 1991

THE ORIGINAL COLONIES met at Jamestown in 1619 to form our first representative assembly. In the decades following, those colonies grew in commerce, population and law to become independent sovereign states. Although they bonded together to declare and win their independence from England, the states began fighting each other economically and politically after the Revolutionary War. Struggling for their future, each state sent delegates to Philadelphia in May 1787 to resolve the conflict. Over that hot, tiresome summer the United States Constitution was drafted. It was signed September 17, 1787, by thirty-nine delegates, of which twenty-three were Freemasons.

The basis for our constitutional form of government came from the colonial experience and the years of trial and error that followed. It involved the concept of a limited government with balanced executive, legislative and judicial powers. For more than 200 years, this balance of power has been held together by the United States Constitution.

It is more than a document. The United States Constitution represents a will of the people that has continued to develop in response to the demands of an ever growing society. Yet with all of the actions surrounding it, the Constitution has never been fundamentally revised. It remains the supreme law of our land. It is the shield of democracy under which we as Americans govern ourselves as a free people.

In this spirit, I proclaim the month of September 1991 as CONSTITUTION OBSERVANCE MONTH in the Jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of California and direct every Lodge to commemorate the anniversary of the United Stated Constitution with a patriotic program. I also urge that these programs be held for the public and be given the widest publicity possible.

I further direct that this Proclamation be read at the August and September Stated Meetings of each Lodge and urge that the Flag of our Country be formally presented at the September Stated Meeting.
