



our Ceremonial Assistants P.Q. Tina Adams and P.Q. LeeAnn Shults, who outdid themselves in their efforts.



The Morgan Affair:

The Kidnapping that Changed American Freemasonry

The 11th annual California Masonic Symposium will present an examination of the disappearance of William Morgan in 1826, which sparked an anti-Masonic movement in the U.S. This movement would have a lasting effect upon American Freemasonry.

This year's presenters will address questions such as:

How did American Freemasonry change as a result of the Anti-Masonic period? What policies and practices did the fraternity institute in order to regain public trust and protect itself from further infiltration? Henry Wilson Coil Lecturer Mark A. Tabbert, Director of Collections at the George Washington Masonic Memorial in Alexandria, Virginia and author of "American Freemasons: Three Centuries of Building Communities"

What was the social, economic and political climate at the time? How does this climate explain America's reaction to Morgan's disappearance?

R. Stephen Doan, Past Grand Master of Masons of California

What were the events leading up to and surrounding William Morgan's disappearance and the investigation which followed?

Art Weiss, President of the California Masonic Foundation

The Symposium will conclude with a panel discussion.
