

PUBLIC SCHOOLS NEED OUR SUPPORT

Perhaps some of our members are not aware of how certain factions are working to undermine our public schools system. The Grand Lodge of California is very concerned about this activity.

A petition is now circulating to get enough signatures of registered voters to place on the ballot next spring a referendum measure which will set in motion a system whereby the State will issue vouchers directly to parents of students in the first twelve grades. There is no restriction on where these vouchers can be spent.

The Voucher System will undoubtedly funnel a tremendous amount of money away from public schools. Parents of private schools now must pay for their children's education from their own funds, and if the law is changed they will naturally use the taxpayers' money instead of their own.

There is presently a tendency for parents to send their children to private schools to circumvent the busing law which was

mandated by higher courts to achieve racial balance in public schools. We can understand why these parents are objecting to the bussing their children out of their neighborhood, but also feel the voucher system is not the answer to the problem.

Not enough signatures were obtained to place the matter on the November ballot this year, but it may be possible to achieve this by next spring. We ask you to carefully consider what you are doing before signing any petition to transfer tax money to private schools

About five southern states have practically destroyed their public school system by enacting of similar laws. We should not allow this to happen in California. We must do everything we can to stop the distribution of our tax money to private schools. If the proposition happens to get enough signatures to gain a position on the ballot, it will cost immense amounts of money to prevent it being successful in passing. Now is the time to stop it if we can.
