MASONIC INFORMATION AND EDUCATION PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK

The following article excerted from "Highline Happenings" of the Washington School District paper "Voyager", has some worthy thoughts and facts about our Public Schools - read on:-

"How many of us think back to when we were in school, and wonder whether schools are as good for our kids as they were for us? There are some interesting national statistics which are important to remember when we begin to think that "Things used to be better".

In 1900, for example, 6% of the 17-year olds in the United States graduated from High School. By 1950, the figure was still less than 50%. In 1975, 74% of our 17-year olds had been gratuated, and by 1977, that figure exceeded 80%. In 1950, 10% of black students graduated from High School; by 1977, the rate rose to 76%.

In 1910, the average 25-year old American had completed 8.1 years of schooling. In 1950, that figure rose to 9.3 years, and in 1975 it was up 12.3.

In 1940, only one out of 20 people in the 25 to 29 year age group had earned a bachelor's degree. In 1976, one out of four in the same age group had earned a bachelor's degree.

Literacy figures also provide some insight into how well our education system is working. In 1900, 11.3% of our people could not read or write. By 1920, that figure was cut in half. By 1970, only 1.2% were illiterate. In Washington State, the figure is less than 1%.

No one in the field of education can be complacent about the state of education in America's schools. There is work to be done to improve the services provided to students and the success and achievement of those students. At the same time, it's important to remember that we're providing more services to a broader range of Americans than ever in the past, even when "we were in school".
