

Letter To The Editor:

My Brothers, another new year is upon us, bringing with it a situation which even though might not cause alarm, certainly warrants attention.

For the past year a survey has been conducted and based on a paid-up membership of 850 members Las Palmas Lodge has enjoyed an average attendance of 5%. Think, my brothers,

40 members out of 850. This includes officers, deacons, and tilers.

I would like to ask you, Please, close your eyes for a moment and think back to the reflection of your excitement and anticipation when you were going through your first degree and inspection. Masonic tradition forbade the lodge to come to you, leaving the only course of action for you to come to the lodge. A great deal of effort, time and energy has been invested in making the Masonic lodge a desirable place for eligible members to want to be.

But now we are faced with a situation where new members are joining the Masonic lodge at a far slower pace than the active members either become inactive for health reasons or other reasons too numerous to mention.

In short, my brothers, it has become necessary to take a short recess from the anxiety of receiving new members to the responsibility of activating our idle members. If each member within the body of Las Palmas lodge would take the responsibility of having one idle member who has not attended lodge for the last 90 days and see that he gets to lodge — what a change we would experience.

It is the opinion of this writer that we as general membership owe it to the officers who, regardless of rain, wind or sleet, and above all, fog, personal occurrences or other desires, never fail to give the membership body a lodge to attend. It is the hope of this writer that some part of this situation will be brought to the attention of the floor that will cause an action to raise our attendance in the very near future.

MASONIC INFORMATION & EDUCATION

HAPPY EASTER — EGG

With Easter approaching, the latter part of this month, and thinking ahead as to its meaning — we are engrossed with the reverent solemnities of Christ's crucifixion, resurrection, and ascension to everlasting life.

But what about the popular symbols of Easter, like flowers, lambs, bunny rabbits, and colored eggs? Off hand, these seem far-fetched and almost sacriligious in light of the true story

of Easter — but is it? Certainly the time for Easter is springtime (Webster says — “An annual Christian festival celebrating the resurrection of Jesus, held on the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after March 21.”). It is the period of year for new growth — flowers and animal births, but what else?

Well, the lamb — (Paschal Lamb) among ancient Hebrews, was slain and eaten at the Passover, while Christianity regards the lamb as an epithet for Jesus, one of several symbolic representations of Jesus, as in “Agnus Dei”, or “Lamb of God”.

An encyclopedia I have, states that there can be little doubt that the use of eggs at this season was originally symbolical of the revivification of nature — the springing forth of life in the spring season. The practice is not confined to Christians; the Jews used eggs in the feast of the Passover; and we are told that the Persians, when they keep the “Festival of the New Year”, (March), mutually present each other with colored eggs. From the Christian point of view, the “Feast of Eggs”, has been usually considered as being emblematic of the resurrection and future life. Perhaps the most lavish of decorated eggs the world has ever known are the imperial Russian Easter Eggs created under the direction of Peter Carl Faberge between 1884 and 1916. He was jeweller to the Czar. The first such egg is believed to have been ordered in 1884 by Alexander III for Czarina Maria Feodorovna. Such gifts to imperial family members became an annual affair. They were bedecked with jewels and precious metals and were worth thousands of dollars. Some had spring wound mechanisms that made them mobile, and some were like jewel boxes. Other simpler decorated eggs have been found in 7th century B.C. burial sites in Italy and Greece, and some have been traced to 11th century Poland and England in 1290.

Also in contrast to the solemnities of Easter, many Easter greeting cards are for “Joyous Easter”, with lillies and other flowers, which probably relates to the end of sacrifices made during Lenten period terminating at Easter, with rejoicing and laughter, and/or elation in the thought of the eternal life which we all hope to enjoy.

So, Happy Easter, and ENJOY!
