Here we are again rolling through the "dark" summer. We have had some excellent young men entering applications and passing through the degrees this year and are looking forward to a few "raisings" when we return in September.

Speaking of raising and passing, we have indeed just passed by one of the most important days in the Masonic calendar – St. John the Baptist's Day – June 24th. One of our two patron Saints, the other being St. John the Evangelist, his birthday was reckoned centuries ago as the Bible clearly states that he was born 6 months before Christ. This day also

corresponds to the summer Solstice. According to McCoy's Masonic Dictionary, the Festival of St. John is "a duty of every Mason to participate in, and should serve to be a renewal and strengthening of fraternal ties and a celebration of Masonry..." In Europe in older times this feast was also called the "Setting of the Watch" and celebrated by bonfires lit in the gloaming of the evening accompanied by various revelries.

Our two Patrons represent many things to Masons. Symbolically they are represented by the two parallel lines bordering the circle with the point within and present the balance of passionate zeal bounding one side and the learned knowledge of faith on the other. In reflecting and studying this we indeed learn to "circumscribe our desires and subdue our passions".

Another aspect I found very interesting – and a bit speculative – was in the alchemical symbols of our Patrons. St. John the Baptist is represented by the symbol for water – the inverted triangle. And St. John the Evangelist by the symbol for fire – the upright triangle. Taken together, the symbols form a perfect geometrical balance of fire and water, darkness and light, winter and summer, life and death, passion and constraint. Superimposed on one another the symbols form the Star of Solomon - the interlocked star - and even the square and compass! Something to muse on during our dark interlude.

As our family looked over the joyous pictures and events that have transpired this year, I caught myself completely enamored by the wondrous display of the Great Architects creations. One cannot help but acknowledge that we are simply a mere speck in the enormous cogs of this cosmic machine. The Creators hands have brought into existence wonders the human mind can never truly comprehend. Like children in a vast library, it is possible we were never meant to understand it all, but it is absolutely fun to look at the pictures, stare at the night skies and imagine...

Summer is upon us once again. **Independence Day**, commonly known as the Fourth of July, commemorates the adoption of the Declaration on Independence from the Kingdom of Great Britain. Thirteen colonies voted to

adopt a resolution of legal separation on **July 2, 1776**. This is the *actual date* the resolution of independence was approved in a closed session of the Second Continental Congress. In a *remarkable coincidence*, both John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, the only signers of the Declaration of Independence later to serve as *Presidents of the United States*, died on the same day: July 4, 1826, which was the **50**th **anniversary** of the Declarations celebrated date. 56 men signed the Declaration of Independence. It appears that 9 (or 16%) were Masons.


Speculative Freemasons have long seen themselves as philosophical builders rather than physical layers of stones. The young United States was the opportunity to put theory into practice. After the hard decision had been taken to declare independence, the United States was seen as the grand experiment, built upon the principles of equality, freedom and enlightened reason. This symbolism resembles the threefold lesson of Freemasonry, "Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth." In fact, early arguments for independence were often worded as "relief" from an infringement of human rights. What a relief it is to live in such a wonderful and free country. We are truly blessed.

Freemasonry is a beautiful system of morality, veiled in allegory and illustrated by symbols. While stone Masons used certain tools to construct monuments and inspiring architecture, Freemasons use these same tools in a symbolic way for building one's character. Often described as an established "self-help" program, its aim is to help men make themselves better people to their family, friends and community. Taking good men and making them better is what we are doing right here at LPP. So what does the month of July hold for us here at Las-Palmas Ponderosa Lodge?

From the Fresno Grizzlies to the Morgan Affair, many fine events are sure to take place in and around these Masonic walls. We have had three 2nd degrees for our newer brothers and look forward to other good times ahead before we go dark. Some may include barbeques and fireworks, friends and family, smiles and laughs and even an outing at the old swimming hole. Curl up with a


